In this session we will present you a short overview of PURE (ITM's Central Research Information System) And ORCID. We'll tell you how PURE works, what it is used for and show how you can use it yourself. We will introduce ORCID to you, what and where it is used for and how you can easily and automatic can update your profile. At the end of this session you will have a complete ORCID profile that can be use when applying for grants, publications, funding etc. and that will improve the visibility of you and your scientific work/ career. After this session you will understand how research information is integrated in PURE and provided to the government. You will be able to : look up information about ITM researchers, research units and projects, update your personal information, add your publications to your profile, extract a CV from PURE (including your publications). You'll be able to create your own ORCID ID and link it to your PURE profile (if not already done).

FYI: ORCID ID's are mandatory for all FWO applicants.

Numerous citation-based indicators have been developed to summarize scientific impact including journal impact factor, h-index, citation indexes, altmetrics... however no metric is perfect, each has a purpose, each has limitations. In this session we will guide you through the 'bag of metrics' and you will learn which metrics you can use to find out your scientific impact.

Nowadays funders tend to ask for a motivation statement in which applicants elaborate on their reasons for applying for a fellowship grant. A motivation statement should highlight your scientific background and competences and it should offer a clear overview of the skills that you already developed and competences you still need to be acquire as a scientist. Frequently combined with a strict word count, writing a sound motivation statement seems like being asked to climb the Mount Everest barefoot. In this workshop you will be asked to share your own ideas and experience with statement writing. We will tackle the following questions

- (1) what is a motivation statement and what isn't?
- (2) the writing process: do's and don'ts and
- (3) learning by doing: examples on optimising your statement.

- (1) asking for active consent from the subjects (ITM consent form),
- (2) usage rights: who owns the pictures and what rights do the subjects of the photos have,
- (3) ethical questions, for example taking photos of children/patients, especially if they are not the subject of your research,
- (4) composition – few tips and tricks such as how to present subjects as actors instead of victims, not showing the problem without the solution, avoiding bird’s eye view, staying away from the clichés about LIC countries, etc.

The Good Clinical Laboratory Practice (GCLP) course describes the standards to be followed by laboratories that perform analysis or evaluation of clinical trial samples. In this course we will focus on the Principles of Good Laboratory Practice (GLP) and more specific for analysis or evaluation of clinical trial samples. The GCLP rules were introduced because the GCP guidance contains insufficient detail to provide specific guidance to clinical laboratories. The guidance is to ensure the quality and integrity of test data related to clinical studies. The way in which study data, is generated, handled, reported, retained and archived has continued to evolve in line with the introduction and ongoing development of supporting technologies. However, the main purpose of the requirements of GCLP remains the same in having confidence in the quality, the integrity of the data and being able to reconstruct activities performed during the conduct of clinical studies in your laboratory.

In this course we will give an introduction on the basics of GCLP and how to implement it in your laboratory. This course is also interesting for those who want to set up a quality system in their laboratory and want to have more confidence in the quality and integrity of study data.

This course is recommended for: PhD students who work in a lab, lab managers, lab project managers, and other lab staff, within university labs and hospital labs involved with clinical trials but also for those who are considering to bring their lab activities to a higher quality level.
